Since we are objective observers and don't participate in the system, we don't engage in the drama. We can support our auditees on their journey and show them how to make their work easier and their environment more calm.




4 PRACTICE FOREBEARANCE

7 REMAIN FAITHFUL

8 CONVEY GENTLENESS

Auditors gently lead auditees to solutions resolving risks instead of insisting on their own way at the cost of relationships and long-term organizational goals. Auditors let go and allow the auditee direct their own operations.
